100 — Emanuel Trophy Piano Competition

Saturday 11 April 2026, from 1:30 pm

This competition is for a Challenge Trophy and a cash prize of **£750**.

If there are four contestants or more, the Trophy will be awarded to the winner to be retained for one year. If there are six contestants or more, there will be a further cash prize of **£250 to the runner-up**.

The Emanuel Trophy Piano Competition is the Festival's top piano competition and is one of the most prestigious within the festival movement. It was founded in 1985 by Emanuel Cedar (1916-2000). "Manny" entered North London Music Festival piano competitions as a young pianist, became a Festival Council Member in 1960 and Festival Chairman in 1975. The competition continues to be sponsored by Manny's family.

The 2026 competition will be open to the winner of the top senior piano award at any UK Music Festival held between 1 January 2025 and 31 December 2025. Entries will only be accepted if submitted via the Secretary, or Section Secretary, of the Festival represented. If the top prize-winner has already been entered to represent another Festival then the Secretary should, if possible, enter the next best pianist.

Nominations for the Emanuel Trophy should be made using the entry form that can be downloaded from the Festival's website. The completed form should be sent to Janice Twisleton by post or email (janicetwist@talktalk.net). **Entries cannot be made via the play and perform platform.**

The closing date is Sunday 15 February 2026.

Rules for the 2026 Emanuel Trophy Competition

- **The 2026 competition is open to the winner of the top senior piano award at any Music Festival held between 1 January and 31 December 2025.** If the top prize-winner has already been entered to represent another Festival then the Secretary should, if possible, enter the next best pianist.
- The contestant must have received a mark of 88 or more or be in the Outstanding Category if the “Category System” is used. They can be of any age but are expected to be of at least Grade 8 standard.
- Two contrasting pieces are to be played, and the performance must last no longer than 15 minutes and not less than 10 minutes. One of the pieces may include more than one movement. Competitors not conforming to these limits will be disqualified.
- Playing from memory is not essential.
- Candidates must provide the Adjudicator with a clean copy of the music for each work to be performed.
- The Adjudicator’s decision will be final.
- Entries must be received by Sunday 15 February 2026.
- Entries will only be accepted if submitted through the Secretary, or Section Secretary, of the Festival concerned.
- Only one contestant from each nominating Festival will be eligible.
- All television, radio and recording rights are reserved by the organiser of this competition – the organisers being the Executive Committee of the North London Festival of Music, Speech & Drama.
- Competitors are reminded to wear dress appropriate for a performance.
 - If an entrant has been a pupil of the Adjudicator in the 12 months prior to the Festival or is well-known to the Adjudicator, they should contact the Section Head before entering.

A cup and a **£750 cash prize** will be awarded, to the First Prize-winner and a **£250 cash prize** to the Second Prize-winner. The Hampstead Garden Suburb Residents Association is generously sponsoring the First Prize.

This competition was previously the Appelbe Piano Prize and has been a component of the North London Festival since 2013. It is both a celebration of creativity centred around the piano repertoire, and a platform for talented pianists to exhibit their technical and artistic prowess.

The 2026 competition will be live and is open to pianists currently studying in the Senior Department of any UK Music College, Academy or Conservatoire.

Entrants are to perform two contrasting pieces by different composers with a **time limit of 15 minutes**; one piece may include more than one movement.

A spoken introduction to the musical programme is an integral part of the performance. It should include an announcement of each item and composer as well as giving details and points of interest about the music, or the background to the circumstances of, or reasons for, its composition. Notes may be used as long as they do not interfere with the sense of communication with the audience. Both the spoken introduction and the performance **must be within the 15-minute time limit**. Both the introduction and the subsequent pacing and sequence of the programme will be taken into account in the adjudication.

If an entrant has been a pupil of the Adjudicator in the year prior to the Festival or is well-known to the Adjudicator, they should contact the Piano Section Administrator before entering.

At approximately 6 pm on the same day there will be a short concert in the Free Church, at which winners and outstanding players may be invited to perform. When you enter, please indicate whether you would be available to perform, should you be invited to do so. Availability to perform at the evening concert will have no influence over the result; the Adjudicator will not be aware of whether entrants can perform at the concluding concert.

If an entrant has been a pupil of the Adjudicator in the year prior to the Festival or is well-known to the Adjudicator, they should contact the Section Head before entering.

The European Piano Teachers Association Cup will be awarded to the most talented pianist under 16 years of age.

Entrants must provide the Adjudicator with a clean copy of the music for each work to be performed, and pieces may not be repeated in different competitions.

These classes are designed to provide performers with constructive feedback on their playing as they prepare for their exam. Every entrant receives a certificate and for each class the Adjudicator may award 1st, 2nd and 3rd place medals and certificates.

Entrants are reminded to introduce themselves and the piece(s) they are playing and to wear dress appropriate for a performance.
